From our pastor

"Even if someone sins against you seven times in one day and returns to you seven times and says, 'I am changing my ways,' you must forgive that person." Luke 17:4

Forgiveness is hard. It often feels foolish, even dangerous. What does it teach a person who wrongs us if we keep forgiving them? Doesn't that enable an abuser to keep on abusing? Understood rightly, forgiveness does not cover up wrongs or excuse abuse. In fact, it does the exact opposite. The first step of forgiveness includes an accusation. To forgive another person is to accuse them of wrongdoing. It's precisely not covering up evil and pretending like it didn't happen. When you forgive another person, you name and acknowledge the wrongdoing. This takes great courage, especially when it involves someone you care about or has power over you.

The second step of forgiveness is even harder, and that's letting go. The word "forgive" in Greek means to release or to let go. It's to say to the one who's harmed you, I am letting go of my claims for retribution against you and giving you back to God. I do not excuse what you did. You were wrong, but I am renouncing my need for vengeance against you. Of course, personal forgiveness doesn't necessarily mean there are no legal consequences, but it does mean you let go your personal need for retribution. This feels impossible. Left to ourselves, it is, but forgiveness, like faith itself, is a gift from God. It's not something we do. It's something we receive. By grace we receive the gift of God's forgiveness, and often in spite of ourselves, that gift flows through us to other people. That's how forgiveness works. God gives. We receive, and that gift flows through us to others.

When we consider the great injustices in our world, like the war in Ukraine, or the still unaddressed trauma of racialized terror against people of color in our county both past and present, forgiveness is an impossible demand, except for fact that God forgives forever and infinitely. In doing so, God does not shrug off the sin of this world, but names it and forgives it. What Bishop Desmond Tutu said about South Africa after apartheid can be said about our country and our personal lives as well: "Without forgiveness, there's no future." Because God forgives, we can learn to forgive as well. Because God forgives, there is a future.

During October, coats can be deposited in a crate in the hallway marked "CCHH Coat Collection." Coats of all sizes are needed and also hats, mittens, and scarves are welcomed. If you aren't able to bring coats to the church, on October 29 coats will be collected in the parking lot from 10:00 to Noon.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance - Ukraine

We are grateful for the outpouring of prayers and calls from congregations and individuals asking how they can help. As the violence continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and

ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority as PDA is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work.

We are hearing that the reformed churches in Ukraine and the region are also feeling called to join in the humanitarian response. PDA, therefore, anticipates that our response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.

As we pray for an end to this violence, we ask the U.S. Government and our European allies to make a commitment to the Ukrainian people for a peaceful solution. We don't know how long it will take, but we know that they will need help with the rebuilding of their country so that those who are fleeing now may one day return home safely.

CATCH COURT and Freedom a la Cart

For many years, Covenant members have made efforts to support programs for women who were trafficked and who are trying to recover their lives especially through CATCH Court's program. Each month, we take lunch for 55 people to CATCH Court on the first Thursday of the month. After serving lunch we have the option to stay to observe court in action. This is always inspiring because there is so much love, courage and determination expressed by the women, and you are invited to be part of this!

We have also provided resources such a toiletry bags and clothing for Freedom a la Cart which provides training for women in catering, food preparation and restaurant operations. Helping women regain drivers' licensing and providing activities for CATCH Court graduates, Butterflies, are among the many services we can help support. In December we will host the annual Christmas party for the CATCH women.

Opportunity to Serve by Providing Lunch through the OPEN SHELTER

Do you want to do hands-on mission once a month or occasionally? We would love to welcome new people to the Open Shelter Lunch Making Team!

Join us! You could shop in advance, prep in advance on a Thursday, join the team that works together on a

Friday morning, or deliver the finished product on a second Friday morning at 9:10. We'd love to expand the team of people involved to create the lunches for **Friday**, **October 14th** and in any future month

Covenant helps out people in need (including the homeless) served by the Open Shelter by providing 175 sack lunches on the **second Friday of every month**. We revised the menu and process, and we need more volunteers to help out! Here are ways to join in:

- Anytime, you could drop off your clean, lidded take-out containers (reusable disposable food
 containers) to shelving on the counter under the windows of Covenant's kitchen. We take them to the
 Open Shelter to help people take home leftovers from donated restaurant meals. When these meals
 are donated, people are encouraged to take sack lunches with them to-go as well.
- You could help with supplies for the sack lunches; we would let you know the quantity, and you'd
 deliver them to Covenant's kitchen by the Thursday before the delivery day (church closes at 4pm) or
 by the second Friday of the month at 8:15, when we assemble the sack lunches. The costs for these
 supplies may be reimbursed by submitting your receipts to our Financial Administrator, Tanvi
 Bhowmik. Ways to help include:
- You could shop for supplies (like paper bags and napkins from GFS, drinks, plastic bags, sandwich makings, bananas...)
- You could make 45 or 90 bags of unsalted nuts at your home.
- You could make 45 or 90 bags of baby carrots at your home.
- You could make 30 Peanut Butter and Jelly sandwiches at your home.
- You could help make 160 ham and cheese sandwiches with the team at Covenant's kitchen, and then
 assemble the lunches into paper bags and pack them in boxes and into a car (or two) between 8:15
 and 9:10 am on the second Friday of the month.
- You could transport the lunches and other supplies from Covenant to the Open Shelter on Parsons Ave. by 9:30 on the second Friday of the month. This takes either two drivers or one driver with a minivan.

By splitting up the work, we can get more people involved sharing the Love of Christ in our community. Join us!
