International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP)

Christian persecution is on the rise world over. Today, more than 360 million Christians live in places where they face high levels of persecution. In many parts of the world, every day, Christians are harassed, discriminated against, wrongfully imprisoned, and even killed because of their faith. According to the World Watch List for Christian Persecution, over 5000 people were killed in 2021 because of their faith in Jesus. This is a staggering number.

The Bible tells us that everyone who desires to live a godly life will be persecuted (2 Timothy 3:12). However, this is not the complete story. In the Bible, Jesus says that: "In this world, you will have trouble, but take heart, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). Persecution, therefore, is not a defeat for the believer!

IDOP is an annual, global event to pray for the persecuted Church. Let's unite in prayer on November 6th & 13th and ask the Holy Spirit to enable those persecuted to stand firm in their faith and be obedient to Christ, even as they serve Him through many hardships. Pray they Stand Firm!

A Unified Front

Ephesians 4:1-6

1I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, 2 with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, 3 eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. 4 There is one body and one Spirit just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call 5 one Lord, one faith, one baptism, 6 one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

"I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you...." That use of the word "you" there is corporate. "I urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called..." This calling is not vocational. He's not talking about someone's calling to be a plumber, a banker, a teacher or whatever. He's not talking about a calling into local mission, international mission, to be single or to choose this major or that major. That's not the type of calling that Paul is talking about here. The type of calling that he's talking about here is more fundamental. It's the calling that he has been talking about in Ephesians 1-3, namely the calling of these men and women into the family of God. That's what Paul is talking about.

He spent chapters 1-3 explaining to these Christians how they've been brought into the family of God, and with wonder and praise he has explained to them that they have been chosen and adopted. So, in chapter 4, Paul makes the transition to exhorting them to live in light of this calling. He's saying, "In light of you being called into God's family by faith, live like it. Live in light of that calling." This is an inside-out living. No other religion operates this way. Inside-out living is taking the gospel you have said you believe, embracing it, and now it is internal and has pierced your heart, then you live that way, from the inside out.

All other religions of the world are outside-in. They operate on the principle, "I am accepted by God because I obey Him. I obey God, I do this outwardly so He'll accept me." Christianity is the opposite. Christianity is, "I've been accepted by God through Jesus Christ; therefore I obey." One is outside-in and the other is inside-out. This is the anchor Paul has set for us. Live like this, inside-out.

As we move along, we find our health is seen in the way that we conduct with one another in verses 2 and 3. ²with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. Humility seems to be a characteristic Paul speaks on a lot in his letters. Interestingly, the term humility was uncommon in first-century Greek literature; when it did appear, it was used with a negative connotation (Thielman, Ephesians, 253).

Pride was more of a highly valued quality of that day. Christians were ridiculed for their humility. We live in a similar day. The opposite of humility is "self-exaltation."

Our culture says, "Exalt yourself," "Pamper yourself," "Think about yourself first." That is the problem! You only think of yourself! Pride means being filled with self. On the contrary, humility is being filled with God (Eph. 3:19).

Paul then finishes out this little section by telling us to be gentle, patient, bearing with one another, and eager to maintain unity. That is when the church will glorify God, when it finds unity. And then to round out, Paul says we are to be ... One body, one Spirit, one hope, believing in one Lord, one faith, one baptism, to only one God and Father.

One body. We share a common existence in Christ's church. We are diverse in background and gifting, but we are united as one. One Spirit. We share a common origin in the Holy Spirit's work. The Spirit is the One who creates unity and empowers us to maintain it.

One hope. We share a common hope in Christ. Formerly, we were "without hope" (2:12) until Christ. Now we have hope, and we must live in a manner worthy of our calling. One Lord. Believers confess and proclaim "Jesus Christ as Lord" (2 Cor 4:5). When the early Christians said, "Jesus is Lord," they were saying, "Caesar is not lord." When Jewish Christians said this, they were boldly identifying Jesus with the God of the Hebrew Scriptures (cf. Deut. 6:4). So this was not merely an empty affirmation for early believers. This confession could cause you to lose your head.

One faith. We embrace the essential truths together, for "faith" here seems to refer to the body of truth we believe. One baptism. We share a common experience of being spiritually baptized into Christ. The act of baptism into water pictures this reality. One God and Father. As His adopted children, we share the same Father. He finishes off by saying to be eager to maintain unity. One of the primary issues in the church he's writing to was how to be Jew and Gentile and yet become one as a church.

They had all these Jews and all these Gentiles, and one of the primary reasons he's writing is to communicate, teach them and encourage them how they are one in Jesus Christ, that there is neither Jew nor Greek anymore. If they could figure that out it would speak volumes. This is what we must figure out as a church. When this marks the church, it really speaks loudly to people who are watching, it really speaks loudly to the culture that surrounds. Because nobody else does this. Differences typically divide. We must eagerly pursue unity. We must pursue being the church to the fullest measure.

³⁸Now as they went on their way, Jesus entered a village. And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. ³⁹And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. ⁴⁰But Martha was distracted with much serving. And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." ⁴¹But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, ⁴²but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her.

"Sorry, God, I'm not available right now." We'd never say that, but are our actions saying it for us? When we are stuck in a rut, stressed, or anxious, we need to make ourselves **available** to God.

STOP!!

Wake up. Get ready. Go to work. Stay busy. Run errands. Squeeze in some exercise. Head home. Reply to those texts. Try to relax. Go to bed. Repeat. And repeat. And we never stop.

Sound familiar? We've all had that moment when we wonder something along these lines: "What exactly did I accomplish today?" We're so busy meeting demands and expectations we never stop to question if we're spending our time where we need to or if we're available to God. God wants to connect with us. He wants to talk with us, encourage us, and guide us. But when we're living our days on autopilot, trying to keep up until the next thing comes along, this is what we're saying to God: "Sorry. I'm not available."

When we're not available — when we don't take time to stop — we miss out on what God wants to say and do. Mary knew this. She sat at Jesus' feet just to listen to Him while Martha stayed busy working around the house.

There's power in stopping — in literally being quiet for a moment and listening for God. It can be as simple as taking a few minutes before you step out of the car to go into work, or sitting in silence with your coffee before you turn on the TV in the morning.

Take a moment today to try it. Even if it's only for a couple of minutes, just stop, sit still, and be present. Tell God you're going to focus on Him and listen — and then follow through. God is always speaking; we need to develop the discipline to hear Him, and we can start by making ourselves available to Him.

Name that Tune

Have you ever noticed how sometimes you can hear a song start and only a few notes or a few seconds into it you can tell what song it is? Sometimes even just with one single note you can identify the rest of the song before it even starts. I realize some people are better at this than others, but even those who would call themselves "not good at that" are, more often than not, able to figure out a tune with little information relatively quickly. It's pretty remarkable, the power of music, especially when you think about how few notes there are in western music. There are only twelve tones per octave and around ten octaves that most human ears can hear, that's roughly a hundred and twenty different distinct sounds...that's really not that many. When you think about how many songs there are floating around in the air, it's amazing how the different nuances and varied aspects of sound can make each song unique.

I may be biased here but I think that, among all of God's creations, His two most beautiful are His children and the music He gave us to carry us through our time on this earth. I like to think sometimes that music is the little teaser of our eternal lives with Him, just a tiny taste of what our perfect existence with our Father will be like. It isn't all that strange then when I think about how vastly different each song is from one another. He created us in the same way. He designed each of us with different nuances and varied aspects of creation, to make us each perfectly imperfect and unique, exactly the way He wanted us. Psalm 139 tells us we are all "fearfully and wonderfully made" and tells of how our Father in Heaven created our inward parts and knit us together before we were even born, created in His image and set apart among all His creation.

Next time a song comes on and you recognize it in a second...no, in a fraction of a second...take a minute and thank the Lord for who you are, perfectly imperfect and perfectly you.

Let's start with the truth. Why do we need truth?

We need truth because our enemy comes at us with twisted truth and lies. We need to know the truth so we can quickly recognize an attack. Then we can reject it and replace it with the truth. Scripture tells us Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. We need Jesus.

Righteousness. You see people on a regular basis who are self-righteous, but that's not what he is talking about. We are not righteous people, we are on our own condemned. But if we are in Christ Jesus there is no condemnation because Jesus fulfilled the law on the cross. Jesus and Jesus alone makes us righteous. We need Jesus.

Not through good works, I know that. Not through my pastor, or my parents. Jesus says, "I am the Way the Truth and the Life, no one comes to the Father except through Me". So guess what? We need Jesus.



Greetings from the elders!

The elders continue to review our ministries to ensure we understand how each current ministry fits with the mission, vision, and core values of Central Park Christian Church. This will also enable us to objectively review ministry opportunities going forward. Additionally, we are keeping a close eye on the finances of the church. As you may have noticed, our giving is behind where we had planned (via the annual budget). While this is concerning, our expenditures have been reduced as best we can. As we all know, inflation has had an effect. For example, energy cost has risen significantly despite our energy usage being reduced by a material amount. Continue to pray for our church finances. We know that God provides and we trust Him to continue doing so. We will continue to be diligent in overseeing and stewarding all of which we've been entrusted.

The end of this year is rapidly approaching, and we are working to put together next year's budget, vision, and leadership. There will be a review of all leadership nominations by a committee of elders, deacons, deaconesses, and staff. The committee will reach out to nominees for a brief conversation about the call to leadership. The staff is working on a budget to present to the elders for next year. This is a challenging process because of multiple factors (as we see when looking at this year's budget versus actual giving/expenses). While it is easy to understand the importance of leadership and budgeting, it can be more difficult to quantify the importance of vision. Some are wired toward vision while others are wired towards process. Both are key to the advancement of God's kingdom, and we focus on this as the year winds down because the first three months of the year are key for any church. The new year brings renewed energy before the busy-ness of life catches up with us in late spring and summer. We ask that the congregation pray for our leadership, budget, and especially that God would reveal His vision to Central Park Christian Church.

Finally, we would like to express our public appreciation for our pastors and staff as Pastor Appreciation Month winds down. We are incredibly blessed to have Derek, Jeff, Elijah, Jayme, Linda, and Stacy on our staff.

Hovember at Doorstep

We would like to thank each and every person who has donated to, or volunteered time towards Doorstep in some way so far this year. Our new HVAC system is being installed now!! For the rest of the year we will focus on Doorstep's Christmas Project. We are using the same process and gifts/food as last year, but we are adding clothing to what the adopted households will receive. We currently have three years' worth of new clothing that has been collected, and stored in the basement. This year we will add clothing for as many adoptees as we can, but we are not purchasing any additional clothing items as they will also receive \$20 gift cards per person.

Doorstep will adopt 260 households and 800+ individuals from the Christmas Bureau. Adopted households will receive our regular Christmas food package, a \$20 gift card for each family member, a health kit, blanket or quilt, a household item such as a coffee pot, crockpot, sheet set, school supplies, gifts and toys for household members, and clothing.

NEPAL: Christian Youth Abused by Hindu Father



The decision to follow Christ in Nepal can come at great personal cost.

Iniya received a New Testament after coming to faith in Christ at age 15. She hid the Bible from her Hindu family members by placing it under her pillow, but her younger brother eventually found the Bible and told


their father. Iniya's father shouted at her, threatened her with a knife and told her to give up her Christian faith or leave the house. When Iniya chose to leave, her father burned her clothes, Bible and any other Christian literature he found.

With her pastor's help, Iniya stayed at her church for 15 days before returning home. For the next two years, she tried to continue following Christ secretly despite ongoing emotional and mental abuse from her father and other Hindus in her village. The persecution prevented Iniya from completing high school, so she struggled to find work.

Today, 21-year-old Iniya lives in a different city and attends church nearby. VOM is helping her with living expenses and school fees as she finishes her education and rebuilds her life.

Like Iniya, many Nepali believers experience opposition from family members as well as from extremist Hindus, Muslims, Buddhists and Marxists.
