'The Letter' was premiered a few weeks ago. It's a film about the climate crisis and how it is affecting life on Earth, and features Pope Francis. Described as a 'Message for our Earth', it is from Pope Francis to YOU!

The documentary tells the story of four 'champions' who each receive an invitation from Pope Francis to come to Rome to talk with him about the Encyclical Letter *Laudato Si'*. Those invited represent four voices: the voice of the poor, of indigenous peoples, of the youth and of nature and wildlife.

The film has had an amazing reception, with 8 million views in three weeks. As the film powerfully explains, the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor are growing increasingly desperate. Droughts, floods, wildfires, hurricanes, deforestation - they all keep getting worse and worse.

Screened in halls of power - ranging from parliaments all the way to the COP27 UN climate summit and COP15 biodiversity summit - the film demands politicians to do better, and by touching many hearts and opening new horizons in the Church's ecological conversion, it is hoped it will strengthen people's resolve to bring about climate and ecological justice.

Recycle – Reduce - Reuse

A recent national survey has shown that many of us are still not even recycling basic items such as cardboard, food and plastic, and many feel they are not well informed. But that's obviously not the case around here, as Surrey County Council tells us that Surrey achieved the 3rd best recycling rate in England!

Stop 'wish-cycling'!

Here is a list of the most common 'wish-cycled' items **which shouldn't go into your recycling bin:**

- Takeaway coffee cups - usually have a film of plastic
- Greasy pizza boxes can't be processed (so only recycle the clean covers of pizza cardboard boxes – not the greasy bottoms)
- Polystyrene and bubble wrap
- Used kitchen roll or tissues
- Crisp packets and salad bags
- Dirty takeaway containers
- Toothpaste tubes - made of hard-to-recycle plastic

Recycling tips

Rinse all items before recycling as food and liquid can contaminate and risk potential recycling being sent to landfill.

Remember – glass bottles/jar should be recycled without **lids off**, and plastic bottles with **lids on**.

Broken glasses – even though you can put glass jars and bottles in the recycling, broken glass goes into the black bin. Nor can light bulbs, though seemingly made of glass, go into recycling.

Numbers in the plastic triangle – these indicate if something can be recycled. Numbers 1,2, 4 and 5 are “generally” recyclable, while 3, 6 and 7 are not.

Borough Hall recycling point has now closed The closest collection point for oral/dental care products is in Guildford:

Crisp packets – recycle these at soft plastic collection points at supermarkets such as Sainsbury's, Tesco and the Coop - along with a wide range of other soft plastics used in food packaging.

Compostable and biodegradable products should be composted not recycled.

Tetra Pak drink and food cartons – from orange juice to soup cartons – you can recycle these cartons in your blue wheelie bin.

Recycle your old mobiles 80% of the phone is recyclable, as they contain precious materials such as gold, silver, palladium and other recyclable components - which, if not recycled from old products, have to be mined. If your old phone is still working then charity shops will take them and make money by selling them on; if it's broken take it to a collection point such as WRC at Witley.

Recycle your old clothes 921,000 tonnes of used textiles end up in our general waste every year, which is then either incinerated or sent to landfill. Have you thought of repurposing old items into new items? There are various groups around that can help with repurposing, such as <https://reconsidered.co.uk/> or Sojo App <https://home.sojo.uk/>

Recycle your plastic bottles by using them for refills at [The Yard Market](#) off Godalming High Street, where you can buy a wide range of eco products for house cleaning and personal care.
