#### A Note from the Pastor October 2022

Wow, October is here already. It seems like we just celebrated the 200th anniversary last week. Now the Covered Bridge Festival will be starting soon. Traffic, tents all over town, traffic, food booths, traffic, tourists, and did I mention the traffic? There are times that I have been down by the lake on festival Saturdays and have seen the cars backed up on the bridge. They are usually headed for Mansfield. What astounds me is the fact it is 10 miles from the bridge to Mansfield. People come from all over and are willing to sit in that kind of traffic just to go buy the treasure that awaits tucked in some tent out there in festival land.

The festival benefits a lot of people and organizations. Our church utilizes the festival as our only fund raiser of the year. We park the cars and have the yard sale in the fellowship hall to raise money to operate the church and some ministries. It's a lot of work packed into 10 days.

When Gale and I go to festivals or other such events we look for churches, fire departments, youth groups and other non-profit organizations. We try to support them in any way we can do so. This has been our practice for many years now.

As I was getting ready to write this note someone asked me how long I have been at the church? I started on the last Sunday in October of 2018. I performed a wedding for a young bride from Newport on Saturday night and stepped into the pulpit here on Sunday morning four years ago. I had no idea so much could be packed into four years. Nor did any of you!

My first year was spent getting to know everyone. Learning how things are done, or not done, here. Getting things realigned and reorganized after the time the church spent with no pastor. Putting together an accurate budget and many other things. During the end of that first year two things became apparent. First, I had picked up and begun to read the old blue church history book. It was fascinating. I was quickly surprised to read the congregation was almost 200 years old. I was even more surprised that no one else was aware of this fact. As soon as I told the Ad Council about this everyone wanted to hold a special celebration to commemorate the day. Secondly was the building. Many of you may not know there was a time in my life when I had a remodeling business. I've even built houses. That type of work has continued to be an interest of mine and I have tried to stay up on the products and techniques of the business. I have also continued to do small jobs for friends and others. I started noticing issues with the building and some serious problems in the structure.

As year two started we put together a Capital Campaign Committee. They were tasked with examining all the building issues. Placing them in 4 categories, things that have to be done to save the structure (bricks, windows, roof, and such), safety issues (tripping hazards in the carpets, unsafe steps, emergency lighting), cosmetic and energy saving things that will need to be done (plaster repair, painting, window dressings, changing lights to LED's), and things we would like to get done (new sign, handicap restroom, etc.) We also had a restoration architect examine the church and present a recommendation plan, scope, and cost estimate. The architectural assessment was to cost \$5000, but they decided to donate the work. The Committee completed their work, we presented the plan to the church along with the need to raise the money to proceed in February of 2020. In March of 2020 we had this scary thing called COVID-19 spreading around. We had Dr Steve inform us of the facts as he knew them then. The next week we were closed down due to the virus. We were not able to hold Easter Services in the Sanctuary. We started Facebook Live broadcasts. Honestly, it was a struggle for a while. Trying to get equipment to work, sound to be good, and finding cameras compatible with the computers, about made us pull out our hair. We had outside services at the fairgrounds, parking lot radio broadcasts (remember tooting your horn for the "amens?") There is always Grace that shines through. We reached more than double the people by Facebook than we had in church. We still have a Facebook following of people. We started a "Midweek Chat" that was to last a couple of months that is still going. We also now broadcast our weekly Bible Study that reaches about 60 people. Billie Sue told us about a grant, which we received, that enabled us to buy a high-tech camera, 2 computers with the associated equipment, and 2 tv's so we could project, record, and broadcast our services in a professional manner. Later in the summer we were allowed back in the sanctuary and then had to close again. It was a rough year, but like so many other times, the grace of God shone through this congregation. The online attendance, the outdoors fairgrounds and church attendance, the radio/parking lot attendance was more than many other churches experienced. The Facebook attendance did grew and we still have more people online than in church (although some of them need to be back in church 9.). Even though we were not meeting in the church our expenses kept going. We had to heat and cool the building, although not as much. Kathy was still in the office during regular hours to do all the things she does. Insurance, maintenance, and everything else still had to be paid. Everyone stayed faithful and our church offering didn't falter. Many of you even kept putting money in the Capital Campaign fund. I do have to admit that Christmas is not the same without Hanging of the Greens, Advent, and the Christmas Eve service.

As 2021 began we were still meeting "virtual". I don't like that term because it means just like reality. There was nothing that could match being in church, so there was not much "virtual" to it. Palm Sunday we were back in the Sanctuary. Palm Sunday and Easter Services seemed so extra special that year. We also had two enormous tasks ahead of us, Repair of the building and the 200<sup>th</sup> Celebration. Planning started for both. We applied for every grant we could find, but really did not get any grant money. We sold the parsonage and applied that money toward the Capital Campaign work. The roof was repaired. The bricks were repaired, the chimney was removed, and several openings in the exterior of the church were closed. The brick work was estimated to take 4-6 week, but due to the poor condition of the bricks took 3 months to complete. We also added a beautiful new ramp to the front of the church. There was a gracious person who offered a matching grant for \$25,000 if we could raise a matching \$25,000 and we raised over \$30,000. We also had a couple of sizeable gifts from people outside of our congregation. On Labor Day Sunday we had our kick-off dinner as we started the countdown to the 200<sup>th</sup> Celebration.

#### A Note from the Pastor

As this year started, we removed the old heaters in the sanctuary. The plaster was repaired in the sanctuary and both levels of both towers. The painting was finally done after spending way too many weeks out of the sanctuary. The carpet was replaced. Wheelchair spaces were added. The church is beautiful. The 200<sup>th</sup> Celebration committee worked tirelessly and pulled together a wonderful day. We started the Bus Bunch that takes a bus trip to a restaurant each month. We are looking forward to a wonderful Christmas season again this year. There are families that have refreshed the restrooms, treated the lower level floors, renewed the 2 classrooms including replacing the fiberglass panels in the hallway.


The past 4 years have seen us bid farewell to many of our saints as they went to join the Lord in Glory. We've had a wedding, baptisms, and people join the church. We had the youth active, then COVID, and now they are getting active again. We've added a clothes closet and additionally, assist students with hygiene products. There is now a Bible study happening weekly. We have had a lot happen in 4 years, more than any of us would have expected. It is very apparent the Glory of God shone through as we experienced more in the past 4 years than most churches experience in 15 years. It was only by the Grace of Jesus Christ and the guidance of the Holy Spirit that we did not just survive, we *thrived* in the past 4 years.

There has been a lot the past 4 years since I came to join all of you. More than I ever expected. Some of the events were trying, most were fantastic. I am proud, humble, and so thankful to be a part of your lives and the life of this congregation for the past 4 years. To say I have been grateful and blessed to be with you is an understatement. I look forward to the days ahead, although the LORD could make the next year a little less eventful so we can concentrate on growing in Love, Spirit, Grace, and in attendance too.


