"Love and Light, Part I"

John 3:16-21

11/13/22

- 1) I would like to reflect together with you on the **mission** of God in this world and **your** place in it.
 - a) What exactly is God's mission and in what way or ways are you, "a part of it."
 - i) to what degree have you been the **beneficiary** of his mission, and
 - ii) to what degree are you a **participant** in his mission a mission-**ary**?
 - b) So, there are three specific questions regarding the **mission** of **God**:
 - i) What is it?
 - ii) Are you a **recipient** of it?
 - iii) Are you participant in it?
- 2) While there are other passages that speak to this question, none do so better than this passage as <u>Jesus</u> himself explains the mission of God to **Nicodemus**.

¹⁶ "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. ¹⁷ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸ Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. ²⁰ For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed. ²¹ But whoever does what is true comes to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that his works have been carried out in God."

- 3) One of the first things we see here is that the **mission** of God is represented in the **gift** of God.
 - a) So, if we want to **know** what the mission of God is, we need do no more than **look** at his gift.
 - i) Now, as we do, we see that it is both a gift of **love** (vs. 16-18) and a gift of **light** (vs. 19-21).
 - ii) As we reflect, then, on the degree to which we are both a recipient of, and a participant in, the **mission** of God, we can already begin to **think** in those two categories:
 - (1) To what degree am I both a recipient and participant in the **love** of God's mission/**gift**.
 - (2) To what degree am I both a recipient and participant in the **light** of God's mission/**gift**.
 - iii) Today we will look at the **love** aspect and next week we will look at the **light** aspect.
 - (1) But, I want to underscore that these two aspects of his mission are **inseparable**.
 - (a) To receive and participate in the love **is to** receive and participate in the light.
- 4) The **Love** Of God's Gift/Mission. (Vs. 16-18)
 - a) The love represented in God's gift **begins** with his great love for the **world**.
 - i) The **world**?
 - (1) Creation. (Ps. 145:9, Gen. 8:20-22, 9:8-15, Matt. 5:5, Rom. 8:18-25)
 - (2) **Fallen** Man, the **pinnacle** of his creation.
 - (a) In the **redemption** of man is the **liberation** of creation.

- ii) The **Love**?
 - (1) <u>Unlike</u> the love of the world that we are <u>warned</u> against (I John 2:15-17), the love that God has for the world sees the world in its <u>need</u> and is moved to sacrificially <u>address</u> it.
 - (a) The need of the world is **salvation** (vs. 17), for the world is under **condemnation**. (vs. 18, Eph. 2:1-3)
 - (i) God didn't send his Son to **condemn** the world; we were **already** condemned.
 - (ii) The love of God is **demonstrated** in **looking** past what we were to what we could be again. (Rom. 5:6-8)
 - 1. True love begins with **seeing** another in their need and sacrificially working to **meet** it.
 - 2. The <u>deeper</u> the need, and the more <u>resistant</u> the one in need, the greater the love that's required.
 - a. To fix the problem (**sacrifice**) and to bear the cost (**mortification**).
 - b. To love us required an **infinite** degree of both.
 - The <u>perfect</u> Son of God, delivered into the hands of sinners (<u>haters</u> of God).
 (Isaiah 53:3)
- b) But, the love of God's gift/mission can only be fully <u>calculated</u> when we consider the extent of his love for, "<u>his only Son</u>." (vs. 16)
 - i) This, of course, is the fullest expression of what was **prefigured** in **Abraham**. (Gen. 22:2, 15-18)
 - (1) "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go..."
 - (2) God has openly testified that this is his **beloved Son**. (Matt. 3:16-17)
 - (3) And as the sacrifice of his Son was being made, the <u>anguish</u> of God reverberated throughout <u>creation</u> itself. (Mt. 27:45-54)
 - ii) <u>What</u> could possibly <u>account</u> for God's giving his Beloved, only Son to suffer the <u>torments</u> of hell that were due to us?
 - (1) Giving the Son who **loved** him **perfectly**.
 - (2) For those who **hated** him **perfectly**.
 - iii) The world would say, "Madness."
 - (1) But, for those of us who have been given eyes to see, we <u>fall</u> on our <u>knees</u> in the presence of **perfect** love and cry, "Holy!"
- 5) The mission/gift of God is one of **love** and **light**.
 - a) As it regards the love of God in this mission:
 - i) Are you a **recipient**?
 - ii) Are you a participant?
 - b) We will pick it up there, **Lord willing**, next week.
