# A VIEW FROM THE MANSE

"In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls." - 1 Peter 1:6-9

I recently read that ocean waves are normally created by three forces: wind, seismic events and the gravitational pull of the moon and sun. The article went on to explain that, in parts of the ocean, it is possible for the surface of the sea to move in one direction while the deep sea currents move in the opposite direction.

This is often the experience we have in the Christian life and in the life of the church. On the surface we face trials and storms daily, while cultural & political winds can come against the church. As Christians we often feel overwhelmed when these heavy waves of discouragement, distress and disappointment crash over us. We almost drown in our griefs, fears, frustrations and worries. We feel everything is out of control. Everything in the world can seem so chaotic.

In 1st Peter, the Apostle is writing to a suffering and fearful church. In the midst of a tidal wave of hostility, Peter explains that, despite the surface current, they can know the deep ocean currents of hope, victory, and joy, as they put their trust in the Lord Jesus and look forward to his return.

In this Advent season, it is my prayer for the High Kirk and for each one of you that, despite all the winds and storms that rage around us, we will experience renewed hope, victory in Jesus, and an inexpressible and glorious joy in our soon coming Conquering King.

# **NEWS AROUND THE KIRK**

# PRESBYTERY MISSION PLAN SUSPENDED

The High Kirk (along with 7 other churches) have been successful in requesting a review of the Presbytery Mission Plan for Ardrossan. A review is now underway which may take several months to complete - no later than March 2023. Please continue to pray for Ardeer, Livingstone and the High Kirk through these difficult days.

# **CRISIS BAGS**

We managed to deliver a good number of crisis bags during the pandemic; 214 bags in 2020 and 253 bags in 2021. So far this year we have delivered 256 bags.

St John's Distribution Centre for the North Ayrshire Foodbank is only open by a telephone request. Calls can be made to a special mobile number where you can speak to Danny Murray to arrange a collection or delivery of a Foodbank box of groceries or a Crisis Bag.

# **CHANA**

Churches Homelessness Action North Ayrshire resumed their meetings in the High Kirk Church Hall in 2021. Churches are donating toiletries and cleaning materials for people in the Homeless Hostels and those who have been allocated their own tenancies.

Last year the Night Before Christmas Campaign (NB4CC) gave 150 gifts for those in Supported Accommodation and the Hostel. They were all wrapped in plenty of time for distribution before Christmas.

People in Parishes throughout North Ayrshire contributed over £1000 to NB4CC. The High Kirk and Kirkgate Church also donated a vast amount of toys and gifts to make up Christmas boxes for vulnerable children and young people in North Ayrshire. We intend to do the same again this year at our Gift Service on 4th December.

# **CARE & SHARE LUNCH CLUB**

Fridays 12.30 – 2.30pm in Kirkgate Church

The Lunch Club, for people in need, started up again in October 2021. A free lunch of soup, rolls with sausage and a selection of other fillings is provided. There is also a choice of desserts and fruit. There is a large number of helpers from churches in North Ayrshire.

Those who come along, as well as the kitchen staff and those serving tables, enjoy fellowship through chatting and playing games. Other agencies are invited along to offer help and advice (i.e. Money Matters, Local Housing staff, Alcoholics Anonymous, etc). A hairdresser comes along once a month to trim hair.

A new Care & Share Lunch Club has also opened in St Margaret's Church, Dalry.

### YOUTH CLUB

The Youth Club continued to meet on Zoom throughout the lockdown. In June 2021, we were able to meet in the High Kirk Manse gardens for outdoor activities with food from Dominico's.

The club returned to regular monthly meetings on Sunday evenings 6.30 – 8.00pm in October 2021. Our first three meetings were held in Livingstone Church and in the new year we moved back to the High Kirk. We had an outing to the Bounce Station in Irvine in May and another successful evening of activities in the manse garden in June. This session we have been in the High Kirk Hall and have had a Games Night, a Nativity Escape Room challenge and are planning to have a Christmas outing to LA Bowl in Ayr. Our programme for the new year will start off in Livingstone Church in January. We now have 10 young people attending the Youth Club as well as a good team of young people helping to run the games and activities.

### SUNDAY CLUB

Our Sunday Club groups, Creche, Tiddlywinks, Kaleidoscope and the Youth Group have all been meeting together in the Main Hall since we returned to regular meetings after the pandemic. We have been using the Jesus Storybook Bible DVD's and we all watch these together. We have now covered most of the stories in the New Testament and are working our way through the Old Testament. The children have a choice of activity sheets or craft which helps them to understand and talk about the story they have been learning. It has been so good for us to be back in Church at our Family Services. We really did miss being with our Church family. Thank you all for your love and support.

### PRAYER FELLOWSHIP

How true that is and how many men and women when asked to describe their prayer life respond, "sadly I find prayer so difficult; I keep on praying, yet I'm only a novice. It is so hard and so costly."

It seems to me that when the church gathers to pray we actually encourage one another. We learn from the Scriptures and the Holy Spirit to work at it, to strive to grow together in our prayers. Do you agree?

Every Wednesday morning at 10.30 we meet in St Monach's Aisle to give thanks to God for our Salvation, for our Lord Jesus Christ, and intercede (pray) for the world in its great need as well as the ongoing work in the High Kirk, our community and local churches.

The format is simple. We start with a brief word from the Bible (5 minutes!). This is followed by sharing the needs of our fellowship, etc, and we then spend about 30 minutes in open prayer giving thanks for all that we enjoy about out faith and seek faithfully and systematically to intercede for the church both locally and internationally, for the world and for our missionaries and a host of Christian agencies (eg. Tearfund, Christian Aid, Scripture Union, Faith Mission, India Village Ministries, Rainedge, Release International, etc).

There is no compulsion to pray aloud. One can be an important part of the prayer group by simply being there praying silently.

The early church met like this and was greatly blessed. It seems to me such a pity that many churches don't have such meetings, or if they do, it's normally the smallest one that exists. Could this be a challenge to some of us to make this a priority?

After all, Prayer is the power house; without it we can do nothing. Without prayer we are powerless!

It would be lovely to see you joining with us on Wednesday mornings.

# (CHRISTMAS??) GIFTS

As I write this, it is still October but adverts for all things Christmas have started appearing on TV. It would seem that, despite the "Cost of Living Crisis", and the dire threats of a cold, hungry and even homeless Christmas for many people, there are plenty who will not let us forget what (sadly) has become the "true" meaning of Christmas i.e it is mainly a commercialised money-spinner. Now, before this article is dismissed as another grumpy Scrooge having a pious rant, let me state that there is much about this society's typical way of spending Christmas that is good and commendable. Many families get together and DON'T fight; many lonely people feel included again; and, of course, despite the disappointments experienced and the fortune spent on worthless or inappropriate gifts, some gifts do "hit the mark" and some folks, through sensitively chosen gifts, are made to feel that they are, indeed, appreciated – or even loved!

It may surprise some to know that, like other customs associated with Christmas, the practice of giving gifts actually has its roots in pagan times when celebrations of the winter solstice took place. Then, as Christianity spread during the first millennium, some traditions were merged together and the giving of presents was linked to the wise men bringing gifts for the infant Jesus.

Gifts can vary widely, as can the motivation behind their giving. Some are embarrassingly inappropriate, but some are greatly appreciated. Some may be very pretty but serve no actual purpose beyond that. Choosing a gift can be stressful but, once handed over, it may never again be taken out of the box or wrappings.

Gifts, of another kind, that is spiritual gifts, can also lead to mixed emotions and reactions. Some believers try to avoid the subject altogether, while in other places, spiritual gifts can become all-important. While some run and hide at their mention, others can allow them to usurp the position that is rightly our Lord's. As with many issues, we can start with a view or a theory and then search the Scriptures for evidence, or what are sometimes called "proof texts" to support our particular understanding. Where this topic is concerned, there are a few verses towards the end of 1 Corinthians, chapter 13 that are used to argue that, because we now have the completed Bible, we no longer need supernatural gifts. However, a serious look at those verses will give rise to some very big doubts about using them in this way.

An open-minded, balanced approach to this subject is called for – isn't it always? Personally, I can see no Scriptural reason for denying the operation

of spiritual gifts in the present age. At the same time, I also firmly believe that everything should be done "decently and in order."

If people reading this would like to explore what the Bible says about spiritual gifts, they should read Romans chapter 12, I Corinthians chapter 12 and Ephesians chapter 4. To put what these passages say in context, do read the full chapters. I have found Selwyn Hughes' material on gifting very helpful. He suggests that the Romans chapter 12 section lists what he calls "Basic Gifts" and sees these as gifts we are born with; they are part of who we are. The 1 Corinthians passage he sees as "Gifts we Seek"— or receive. These may be imparted by the Holy Spirit to any believer at any time. John Wimber referred to these particular gifts as "gracelets" and talked of their being distributed by "the dancing hand of God". Some may be granted this kind of gift on only one occasion, but others may develop a ministry in using one or more of them. In Selwyn Hughes' suggested schema, the gifts named in Ephesians chapter 4 are identified as "Gifts that some people Become"

It seems to me that our understanding and use of the word "gifts"- as in our earlier consideration of Christmas gifts etc - can obscure our approach to spiritual gifts. Too often – I believe – and I am about to mount one of my pet "hobby-horses", God's great Salvation is presented as a "fire escape".. In this approach, the only thing that matters is saving your own skin and then, as an add-on, finding something worthwhile to do - oh, and, as a recruiter, recruiting more recruiters, who can recruit more recruiters - and so it goes on as numbers become what really matter. Now, I do not want to sound overly cynical or flippant about such serious matters – "knowing that your soul is safe through all eternity" (as one hymn puts it) is no small issue – BUT it is not the full story. We are here for specific reasons and I find it sad that many experienced believers seem to have no idea what exactly the Lord requires of them.

Discovering one's spiritual gifting can be the big clue or, indeed, the answer to what God is intending one's role in life to be.

# MEET THE MODERATOR

The Very Rev Dr lain Greenshields reflects on the people who nurtured his call to ministry...

It was June 1978 and I was on holiday in Ness, in the North of the Island of Lewis – a place we always referred to as our second home. I knew that my life was at a crossroads and I was seriously considering applying to university to study with a view to eventually working in social work.

As was the church practice in Ness, the church had a "mid-week" service on a Thursday evening in what was called Lional Mission Church, part of Cross Ness Church of Scotland. By this time I had been a Christian for two years.

I walked in, sat down, like a good Presbyterian, at the back of the church and Rev John Ferguson led the worship. When it came to the "sermon", John said, "lain is with us from Glasgow. He will bring us a word."

Totally unprepared, but focussing on what I had been reading from Ephesians in the morning, I got up and "gave my word" – all 20 minutes of it.

Afterwards John Ferguson strongly encouraged me to apply for the ministry in the Church of Scotland, beginning my journey to a call that was to lead to my

acceptance as a candidate and starting studies at Glasgow University in 1979.

Part of my roots – my mother's home – are in Ness. So too is my call to ministry and the place a few months later where I was to meet Linda, my wife. Coincidences? I don't believe in them.

But this is only part of the story. Curiously, I am writing this reflection on an island while thinking of John Donne, who rightly said that no man is an island. Everything leading up to that moment of call was about people. Here in Ness the kindness, love and prayers of ordinary people encouraged me. Is there such a thing as an "ordinary" person? — maybe not. And the skills of doctors who helped me heal from a serious accident along with the wisdom of many other people have helped form me as a person.

Since that moment of call, my life has been the story of an infinitely patient God. It has too been the story of people who have formed and reformed my life: Linda, friends and the people of God whom I have been privileged to serve. People "in the pews" have encouraged, inspired, prayed for me. For we are not "islands" but part of a living body, joined together in faith with a common hope and purpose.

The older I get, the more I see those "connections" and they are always about people – both within and outwith the Church—who have consciously or otherwise assisted me on this journey so far.

On reflection, I think that we do not, in today's church, have the confidence to see and know that God desires to use us to help transform lives. Getting alongside people, supporting, encouraging, nourishing and even challenging people to do more than they might have thought possible is our ministry with and to others. We can do it if we believe enough to not accept second best for either ourselves or other people.

God has changed my life! Without doubt this has most often happened through the influence of other people. My aspiration has always been and still is to inspire the people of God to share their story of faith, through word and action. Now, I know we can never do this perfectly, but we can do it intentionally, prayerfully and consistently, and leave the rest to God.

# In Loving Memory

# TOM MCINTYRE (ELDER)

Tom was born in January 1931 in Saltcoats, to Maurice and Sarah (Cissie), with an older sister Cissie, and brother Maurice.

Tom attended the Kyleshill Primary School (the "Ragged School"), where lifetime friendships formed. Tom was Dux Medallist in 1942.

Following Kyleshill, Ardrossan Academy was next on the education trail. Higher passes were gained in the Science subjects and Mathematics.

Tom then began his scientific career with ICI Nobel division, Ardeer. Studies at Paisley and Glasgow Technical College led to Tom being awarded the Associateship of the Royal Society of Chemists in 1955. Of those who passed in the UK only one came from Scotland!

Further recognition followed in 1972 when he was elected to the Fellowship of the Society.

Tom completed National Service in the Royal Signals. He trained as a Wireless Technician at Catterick and then was posted to Dusseldorf, West Germany and then to the Hook of Holland

After National Service Tom resumed work with the Nobel Division. The establishment of Nobel's Explosives as a separate entity saw Tom move to the explosives section and in fullness of time becoming the Chief Analyst and section manager of the Central Analytical Laboratory, and a recognised inspector and signatory of explosives stores manufactured for HM Govt at Powfoot and Annan factories.

Prior to the early 60s Tom had two great loves – Rangers and Rangers Reserves.

Then along came a young laboratory chemist, named Marilyn Dawson, and the world changed forever. Tom and Marilyn were married in April 1962 in the High Kirk. Two sons, Alastair in 1963 and Graham in 1966 followed. Alastair married Jill, and together they produced Eilidh and Fraser. Tom and Marilyn moved to Diddup Drive in late 1964 and remained there for the rest of their life together. They provided a very happy childhood for their boys.

Tom never gave up his love for Rangers, but showed no sign of disappointment when one son supported Kilmarnock and the other Aberdeen. Tom had been a keen member of the Boys Brigade, but again seemed quite happy when his boys opted for Cubs and Scouts. His job sometimes took him to London, and the boys always looked forward to his return as a trip to London meant a present from Hamley's toyshop.

He was a quiet and modest man and probably never realised how highly he was regarded within ICI, and the industry generally.

A big part of Tom's life was the High Kirk. He was proud to become an elder in the mid-70's and in time became Session Clerk, a role he carried out for a number of years. The Minister regarded him as his right-hand man through those years, receiving a lot of sage advice.

Tom took early retirement from ICI in1985, and this allowed him to give more time to the church and other interests. He had always been a keen gardener and now he could spend more time in his greenhouse, specialising in tomatoes with which he supplied the neighbourhood, even although he would never eat them himself.

We give thanks to God for Tom's life and witness, and continue to remember the family in our prayers.

### SUSAN RODGER

Susan was born in May 1938, the second daughter to Jimmy and Susan Fulton of 30 Morrison Avenue Stevenston.

On leaving Stevenston Higher Grade, she worked in Fleming Reed's Mill in Dalry, and over time worked in various jobs including the canteen at Magnetson, Macy's grocers, a cleaner in various schools and in the ICI Offices.

Susan met Sam at the dancing in the Templar's Hall in Irvine - and romance blossomed! They courted for four years and married in May 1959 in the High Kirk. They were then delighted to see the arrival of their daughter Carol in 1961.

Susan came to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ at South Beach Baptist Church and went on to be actively involved with Sam in the Stauros Organisation, Gideons International and various gospel choirs. She had a passion for sharing her faith in Christ and took every opportunity to witness to everyone she met.
