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Greetings Beloved,

Over the past few months, I have been listening with great interest as the parish musicians have been preparing for their performance of Handel's Messiah. And as I was able to experience it coming together in its fullness, I was absolutely transfixed by the achievement, certainly of our musicians and guests, but of the composition itself. I'm well aware that there are many thousands of pages devoted to reflecting on the Messiah's impact, both small and great. But since Saint John's has just offered the piece in its entirety, again a unique achievement in its own right, I thought that was worth a brief reflection on my part.

The first thing that came to mind as I listened recently was the power of the very words of Scripture. Certainly, Handel's music is itself uplifting, and much can and has been said about the musical composition on its own merits. But as a reader of the Bible, I can't help but hear the music as a means to propel the wonderful words of Isaiah, or Luke, or whichever Biblical writer has been highlighted. Some of you know that I was converted by the very words of the Gospels themselves before I'd even walked into a church building. To hear those sweet words, upborne by such beautiful music, filled me with great joy as I considered that so many people were planning to join us that might hear words concerning our sweet Savior afresh, or perhaps even anew.

I was also moved by the gift of beauty. Many of us are fond of making reference to the deep theological connection between "truth," "beauty," and "the good." With the space I have, let me just say that to experience the beauty of the music of the Messiah alongside the beauty of the text of Scripture, is to somehow gain some greater insight into the perfect beauty that God has prepared for us in His divine love and creativity. In a world that has been marked with the ugliness of sin and death, it is such an honor to be able to provide our little corner of the globe with something so refreshingly beautiful. Consider the sinner who might walk into a concert like the Messiah and be moved by the beauty and consider again that the witness of Jesus' ministry is so beautifully summarized in the piece. Is it any wonder that text, music, and performance might work together to melt a heart and by God's grace, perhaps even begin to reform it?

I had been present to this work after a particularly trying couple of days, and it was a deep encouragement. I pray that even if you weren't able to be with us for the Messiah concert, that the Messiah himself would be present to you in this season of Advent. May he comfort you in your trial and guide you into all truth. May his beauty shine upon you and give you peace, until at the last, we see him as he is, accompanied perhaps by the angelic chorus of Alleluia!

Imagine flying at night and suddenly encountering the sight!

The image of a single light, emerging from the darkness, bringing the hope of eternity to all of us, is the heart of Christmas for me. When we turn down the lights after communion and sing Silent Night by candlelight, my heart is full with gratitude for the promise of love and salvation that renews itself each year. I am especially grateful for my church home at Saint John's and how it teaches and sustains me. I hope each of you has a happy, warm, and blessed Christmas.

Junior Warden's Report-Marc McCau

As we continue to work towards the improvement of our grounds, we have some exciting developments happening. After the spring flood of the basement, we have completed all plumbing repairs and implemented improvements to our piping and sump systems. I am happy to report now that there have been no issues with the downstairs area (besides the damage already done). Now as we move into the next phase of the project, we have contracted with 505 Architects to help us to determine some of the best ways to update our basement after the flood. Our principal architect, Brian Thomas, has connections through Saint John's as an active member of Troop 153. This gives Brian much more in-depth knowledge of our space needs and constraints. The 505 Architects' mission is two-fold:

First, to create a Basement Design Plan, and secondly, to create an overarching Facility Analysis Plan.

Both of these points lead to the same goal for our Saint John's buildings: to focus on how the facilities can provide a more robust missional care for your youth, family, and children that is an extension of the primary focus of Sunday morning and evening worship and musical offerings. Brian and team have already met with several ministry, staff, and committee members to gather inputs to this plan. Inputs inform the support needs that should be addressed by our physical plant in service to our many activities. Brian will continue to work on his plan over the next several weeks until he is able to present the plan to our Buildings and Grounds Committee and ultimately the Vestry. We are all very excited on where this will take us next!

In other news, Mike Reif has accepted a nomination to serve as the new Gardening and Grounds subcommittee chair. As a sitting member of the Building and Grounds committee, Mike will act to organize the campus maintenance of the many church gardens to help provide oversight of their upkeep. 

Inclement Weather Policy Refresher

The church office would like to remind our parish members of the Church Inclement Weather Policy (established in 2020). The purpose of the policy is to establish clear procedures to close and/or cancel operations during inclement weather.

In the policy statement, Saint John's recognizes that adverse weather conditions can impact safety of employee travel and general operations for our facility. Occasionally it will be necessary to close or delay the opening of the office and facility. Saint John's does not advise employees or volunteers to take unwarranted risks when traveling to work in the event of inclement weather.

Office Closure Procedure: the Rector and/or the Senior Warden will decide by 10 p.m. the night before to close for the day, or to open at a delayed time, or to close early due to weather changes. A text message with the decisions will go out to all staff from Director of Finance, the decision is comprehensive – all events, meetings, or commitments at the church campus are cancelled. The answering service will pick up inbound calls and route phone messages as needed. Direct supervisors will contact their team as necessary. Facility staff will be on call. All our staff stay weather aware and are prepared for late weather updates and changes to work schedule.

Specific to worship cancellations, please note:

- Morning Prayer (cancelled if office is closed at that time).
- Evening Prayer (cancelled if office is closed at that time).
- Worship services on Wednesday night (cancelled if office is closed all day or early on that day).
- Sunday worship may be altered due to bad weather forecast for THAT day. Closure will be TBD pending policy decisions. At minimum, parishioners would be encouraged to not come out in hazardous conditions.
- Live-streaming: if clergy offers worship during challenging weather, the church will endeavor to provide live-streaming of the Sunday 10 a.m. service, contingent upon if an AV team member can be present.
