Third Sunday in Ordinary Time – 22nd January 2023 Sunday of the Word of God

When I was teaching at the Seminary I would often take those preparing to be formally instituted as readers to the large Gurdwara in Southall. One of my Sikh scouting friends would show us around and explain the significance of what we saw and answer our questions. The trip would always finish with *langar* in the community kitchen. On other occasions we would head to an orthodox synagogue for the Sabbat service. One of the reasons for these trips was to see how reverence for written texts played out in other religions. One of the fruits of this dialogue was a reflection on our own reverence for scripture and the objects on which they are written.

You may notice some of the ways in which we treat of the scriptures in the liturgy: reading from well-presented books, the kissing of the Gospel and so on. These outward signs invite us to see the Word of God as person, Jesus Christ, and not simply helpful and inspired words on a page. And here lies the main point this week: **the Word of God**, **the scriptures**, **are one of the most important ways in which Jesus comes to meet us and accompany us on our journey of life**.

In his letter instituting this day Pope Francis writes, 'When sacred Scripture is read in the light of the same Spirit by whom it was written, it remains ever new.... The sacred text as a whole serves a prophetic function regarding not the future but the present of whoever is nourished by this word. Jesus himself clearly stated this at the beginning of his ministry: "*Today* this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing". Those who draw daily nourishment from God's word become, like Jesus, a contemporary of all those whom they encounter: they are not tempted to fall into sterile nostalgia for the past, or to dream of ethereal utopias yet to come.

'Sacred Scripture accomplishes its prophetic work above all in those who listen to it. It proves both sweet and bitter. We are reminded of the words of the prophet Ezekiel when, commanded by the Lord to eat the scroll of the book, he tells us: "It was in my mouth as sweet as honey". John the Evangelist too, on the island of Patmos, echoes Ezekiel's experience of eating the scroll, but goes on to add: "It was sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I had eaten it my stomach was made bitter".

'The sweetness of God's word leads us to share it with all those whom we encounter in this life and to proclaim the sure hope that it contains. Its bitterness, in turn, often comes from our realization of how difficult it is to live that word consistently, or our personal experience of seeing it rejected as meaningless for life. We should never take God's word for granted, but instead let ourselves be nourished by it, in order to acknowledge and live fully our relationship with him and with our brothers and sisters.' (Pope Francis)

Bible Alive offers a reflection on the scripture reading for each day. It comes in a small, printed format and also on Kindle. Some parishioners have been subscribers for a long time and really love it. There are some free copies of the February edition at the back of our churches if you would like to try it out for a month.

Pray As You Go Offers a daily prayer session, designed to go with you wherever you go, to help you pray whenever you find time, but particularly whilst travelling to and from work, study, etc. Each prayer session lasts around 10 minutes, and combines music, scripture and reflection.
