Dear Oakhurst Family,

I am grateful for the Holy Spirit calling me into a new way of being in relationship with you. Of course, the Spirit had help from your Interim Pastor Nominating Committee. Their authenticity, honesty, hope, and hard work are a testament to the strong community that exists within the expansive arms of Oakhurst.

Your commitments to hospitality, justice-seeking, and relational ministry are going to be strengths we lean into during this interim time. A time of universal transition and change, multiple pandemics that continue to infect our communities, and a deep commitment in the world around us to sever the webs of support that we seek to strengthen and expand?

It is challenging and holy work that we are about to embark on together, and I look forward to doing it together.

By way of introduction, I am a "cradle Presbyterian" and was also formed in the ecumenical-ish Protestant chapels on military bases. I have three foundational values which ground me in my presence as a mom, daughter, sister, friend, pastor, spiritual director, colleague, swim meet timer, and, really, everything I do. You will witness these as I journey with you and as we seek to deepen and strengthen this community of faith together.

CreationWise Tip

Habits and customs are hard to change, but updating laundry habits will bring immediate benefits to the environment and your wallet. This first change is easy, wash in cold water. This one change will cut your energy consumption for washing by more



than half. Keep in mind that modern detergents are typically formulated to clean just as well in cold water. A second change, air drying your clothes is more challenging requiring space and a bit more of your time, but results in significant energy savings. I confess that I do minimal air drying. Instead, I focus on the third change which is wearing my clothes multiple times before laundering. Many times, shirts and pants worn for a day are not dirty and can be worn again another time or two or three. An added benefit is less laundering extends the life of all fabrics.

CreationWise plans for 2023:

- In January, we'll have a table in the Fellowship Hall after church with ideas to help you Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. Stop by, share your ideas and perhaps learn some new approaches to living sustainably as a part of God's creation.
- On January 25, along with the Peacemaking & Justice committee, we'll have a Meatless Dinner in the Fellowship Hall at 6 pm. The Rev. Tom Hagood, representing the New Sanctuary Movement of Atlanta, will be our speaker. There's no need to bring anything except yourself. Laura Nieto will be preparing a delicious potato soup for all.
- In March, look forward to spring and the new growth that arrives with warmer weather. There will be a special, take-home project to grow microgreens on a window sill in your home.
- In April, look forward to Earth Day Sunday on 4/23!
- Later in the year, we plan to have a special speaker tell us about the birds that nest in our bell tower.
- The exciting possibility of installing solar panels on our sanctuary roof is being investigated. An initial evaluation indicates we could reduce our energy purchases from GA Power by nearly 60%.
