

Life Inside the CPCC Warming Center

Central Park Christian Church opened as a warming center twice during the month of January. The first time, we were open January 5, 6, and 7 because of the blizzard. We stayed open from 6:00 p.m. each evening until about 10:00 a.m. the following day. The second time, during the recent record-breaking cold spell, we stayed open continuously from 6:00 p.m. January 19 until 10:00 a.m. on the 21st.

Every one of those nights had its challenges, but for the most part our guests are people that we have met because of the meals that Mary Flin and Shannon Sadowski provide to our neighbors every Sunday night. We know them, and they know us, and when the weather forces us into what Mary calls a "neighbor slumber party" we are generally able to maintain peace in a room where many of the people are struggling with mental illness or addiction (or both).

Monday, January 20, proved to be the most challenging night because this dynamic changed. Although the Rescue Mission accepted about 30 people on an emergency basis that night, we were the only other warming center that opened its doors. And, as word got out, well-meaning people unaffiliated with our church started bringing people from all around the city and dropping them off at our doorstep. We had served 17 on Sunday night, which seemed like a lot to handle, but on Monday we had 37 spend the night and another 10 dropped in to get warmed up with a hot meal and coffee. We also had 7 dogs and 2 cats.

Given the circumstances, things went amazingly well on Monday night, but the place was very crowded and many of the people were strangers to us and each other. This created a more chaotic environment that was stressful for some of our guests. As a result, we had to deal with more issues during the course of the night and next morning. I don't want to dwell on those issues, because the atmosphere in our warming center is beautiful. But, I think it is valuable to give you a glimpse into the realities of the warming center so you can pray more specifically about this part of our ministry when we activate it. I also think there are lessons that we can learn from these challenges, including the three incidents where I was cussed at very thoroughly by guests.

For instance, one of our neighbors suffers from pretty significant mental health challenges as well as addiction. She has also been abused by many of the men in her life. Michelle and I have gotten to know her a little bit, and we worry about her a lot, so we were glad to see her at the warming center. But, amidst the crowd and chaos on Monday night, she wound up getting triggered by something and started a verbal tirade. When I tried to approach her to calm her down, I was met with a blue streak of cursing and, worse, called a rapist. But this is when the "turning the other cheek" was the only thing needed. The kindest thing I could do was walk away and let a female come to her aid. And all it took was for Shannon, who knows her so well, to offer her some chocolate milk, which redirected her thoughts and immediately calmed her down.

A second situation didn't end as well. Another one of our guests was a woman suffering from mental illness, and despite our best efforts to calm her down she got to the point where she was verbally assaulting everyone who walked by. Eventually, I had to ask her to leave, and this was the one time in five nights that we needed an escort from the police. On her way out, I'm pretty sure she was casting a voodoo spell on me (I'm not kidding!). But I sincerely believe that if she was one of our neighbors—someone who knew us and trusted us because we had developed a relationship with her and expressed love and kindness to her over the course of weeks and months—we could have been more successful in ministering to her needs. I hope you will all join me in praying for this woman who is in such desperate need of mental, physical, and spiritual rescue. I also pray that other churches near her will be able to have the kind of impact in their neighborhood that we are trying to have in ours.

The third situation involved a neighbor I met recently who had expressed a desire to serve God, so I asked him to help out at the warming center while he was a guest with us. Unfortunately, what started out as his aggressive "witnessing" to another guest turned into harassment and then an altercation with another volunteer who stepped in. His anger was then turned on me when I tried to counsel him about his approach to sharing the gospel, and I ultimately had to ask him to leave. But I got a call two days later from a number at the VA, and it was this man asking if he could come by and apologize in person before leaving for a stint in rehab. He had come to the realization that his addiction had caused him to turn on people who had shown him nothing but kindness, so he couldn't justify his aggressive behavior any longer. Friends, if a little verbal abuse is the only price we have to pay in order for people to realize they need to turn things around, then I hope we all get cussed out from time to time!

Apart from the challenges, we were able to see how God supplied all of our needs, often the very amount we needed. The Central Park Community Center recently gave us a number of their old exercise mats, and the Mission sent over 10 of their sleeping mats, which gave us just enough to keep everyone off the hard floor when 37 people stayed over. And you gave us enough blankets that we had a couple left over at the end of the night. We had at least 24 different volunteers on site at one time or another, and I wish I had space to name them all and describe their herculean efforts (except I wouldn't be able to mention John Cantrell, who doesn't want his wife to know how well he can handle a mop). In addition, there were innumerable people who donated food, gloves, blankets, and supplies, literally one after the other at 6:00 p.m. Sunday, and they just kept coming.

Over the five nights of our warming center, we have had many opportunities to engage in spiritual conversations and share the gospel with people. I'm hopeful that we will one day hear testimonies from people who started their spiritual journey to Christ, or back to Christ, because of the love we showed them. Thank you all so much for your support of this aspect of our ministry.

Praise the Lord

Our days on earth are like a shadow, without hope. ¹⁶Lord our God, all this abundance that we have provided for building you a temple for your Holy Name comes from your hand, and all of it belongs to you. ¹⁷I know, my God, that you test the heart and are pleased with integrity. All these things I have given willingly and with honest intent. And now I have seen with joy how willingly your people who are here have given to you. ¹⁸Lord, the God of our fathers Abraham, Isaac and Israel, keep these desires and thoughts in the hearts of your people forever, and keep their hearts loyal to you. ¹⁹And give my son Solomon the wholehearted devotion to keep your commands, statutes and decrees and to do everything to build the palatial structure for which I have provided."

²⁰Then David said to the whole assembly, "Praise the Lord your God." So they all praised the Lord, the God of their fathers; they bowed down, prostrating themselves before the Lord and the king.

Our Steps are Established

As I sit and write this month's newsletter article it's January 16th. I have gotten several compliments on the song selection from this past Sunday. Of course my standard answer is always "compliment God not me." But I have been asked in the past how I go about song selection. Are they all divinely inspired and breathed into my ears...ultimately yes, but it isn't always that plain and simple and this past week was one of those times.

When I sit down to plan out the worship set for a Sunday, there are several factors that play into how I choose the songs. Sometimes they go in line with the message and scripture notes I have gotten from the pastor. Sometimes they relate to a particular Sunday; Freedom Sunday, Christmas/ Advent, Persecuted Church Sunday. Sometimes I follow a theme; a lyrical theme such as trust of faith, songs by a particular artist or songwriter, etc. Sometimes they are requests. Sometimes they're new songs we're introducing. Sometimes they are songs I hear and just think, "ooh, we haven't done that one in a while" or "oh, this one would be good this week." Some of them are just standards that we use for openers or closers or midset "mood" songs. And sometimes they are just songs that move into my brain for a time and won't go away until I put them in the service script, these are usually the ones that are obviously suggested "from on high." But more often than not, they usually seem to be exactly the songs that we need each week. In fact, I would guess that even the ones that aren't plainly evident as such probably mean something to at least one person in the room.

This past week was a combination of those factors. Andy helped me with song selection this week so that brings in the request factor. We added a new song, so there's that one. We did "The Jesus Way" because it was one that had taken up residence in my head and then I heard it and had one of those "ooh" moments, so two of the factors there. Then, we closed with RATTLE! That is a standard closer that we haven't done in a bit.

I didn't go into planning thinking anything particular about these songs and we had our rehearsal and everything seemed fine. But then, after we were done, and as service got closer, I kept running into hurt and sorrow and "world problems" among the members of our congregation, and that continued right up until service started. As I said a silent prayer before we started, God showed me what he had done. He had given me a setlist that was, as I said from stage Sunday, "defiant" of the troubles of this world. Celebratory songs like "Glorious Day," meaningful songs like "Jesus Way" and "No Longer Slaves". Even the new one, "More than Able", shouted a powerful message about trust in Him. Then we ended with the old foot-stomper about those dry bones rattling. On top of all that, "No Longer Slaves", one that Andy chose, tied perfectly into Rick's sermon. It also should be noted that, and some of you may have caught onto this already, but I keep Rich Mullins' "Hold Me Jesus" in my pocket to use as a special whenever the air feels heavy or someone (myself included) needs a healing song like that.

It's just an example of what God does with our lives. He has His plans, His perfect plans, and He uses us to carry them out. We don't always realize it but He's always doing it. Proverbs 16:9, a verse I keep coming back to for comfort and reassurance tells us, "In their hearts humans plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps." When I think of that verse, I'm able to rest in the fact that as long as we trust Him, He will direct everything in our lives, even if it doesn't make sense. He will lead us where He needs us to go.



Did you know we have a "Blessing Box" here in the CPCC neighborhood? Located at Mary Flin's house (also our community Chaplain House), it is the cross-shaped "box" at the edge of the porch/sidewalk at 911 SW 16th.

On your way to or from church, donations of sandwiches, snacks, pantry items... pretty much anything...can be placed in the box. Clothes, blankets, coats, etc. can be put in the black crates on either side of the cross.

We have at least two neighbors who regularly help others with access to food, and if Mary gets too much, she passes it on to another. Everything gets used. Türkiye: Ministry grows amid ISIS threats

Militants aligned with the self-proclaimed Islamic State (ISIS) killed one person in an attack on a church in Istanbul just last year. After the attack, police notified the pastor of another church, in Samsun, that he too was on the terrorists' hit list.

Since then, the Samsun church has received police protection, bringing it to greater prominence in the community. "When the church first started, police took great precautions by bringing a SWAT team to the opening of the church and shutting down the entire street to parked cars," a front-line worker said. "Every Sunday there is a team of five police waiting in front of the church."

Despite the ISIS threat, the pastor and his congregation have continued to meet for regular worship. While the ongoing police presence has caused some uneasiness among church members and may have discouraged some new visitors, it has also increased the church's profile within the community and provided new opportunities for evangelism. The pastor now opens the church every day, offering free tea and coffee to the many students in the area who come to the building to study.

Türkiye has a population of 84 million people, and 96% are Sunni Muslims. Fewer than 1% of Turks are Christians.


