

3 Therefore, holy brothers and sisters, who share in a heavenly calling, consider Jesus, the apostle and high priest of our confession. 2 He was faithful to the one who appointed him, just as Moses was in all God's household. 3 For Jesus is considered worthy of more glory than Moses, just as the builder has more honor than the house. 4 Now every house is built by someone, but the one who built everything is God. 5 Moses was faithful as a servant in all God's household, as a testimony to what would be said in the future. 6 But Christ was faithful as a Son over his household. And we are that household if we hold on to our confidence and the hope in which we boast.

WARNING AGAINST UNBELIEF

7 Therefore, as the Holy Spirit says:

Today, if you hear his voice,

8 do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion,

9 on the day of testing in the wilderness,

10 where your ancestors tested me, tried me,

and saw my works 10 for forty years.

Therefore I was provoked to anger with that generation

and said, "They always go astray in their hearts,

and they have not known my ways."

11 So I swore in my anger,

"They will not enter my rest."

12 Watch out, brothers and sisters, so that there won't be in any of you an evil, unbelieving

heart that turns away from the living God. 13 But encourage each other daily, while it is

still called today, so that none of you is hardened by sin's deception. 14 For we have

become participants in Christ if we hold firmly until the end the reality that we had at the

start. 15 As it is said:

Today, if you hear his voice,

do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion.

16 For who heard and rebelled? Wasn't it all who came out of Egypt under Moses? 17 With

whom was God angry for forty years? Wasn't it with those who sinned, whose bodies fell

in the wilderness? 18 And to whom did he swear that they would not enter his rest, if not

to those who disobeyed? 19 So we see that they were unable to enter because of unbelief.

THE PROMISED REST

4 Therefore, since the promise to enter his rest remains, let us beware that none of you

be found to have fallen short. 2 For we also have received the good news just as they did.

But the message they heard did not benefit them, since they were not united with those

who heard it in faith. 3 For we who have believed enter the rest, in keeping with what he

has said,

So I swore in my anger,

"They will not enter my rest,"

even though his works have been finished since the foundation of the world. 4 For

somewhere he has spoken about the seventh day in this way: And on the seventh day God

rested from all his works. 5 Again, in that passage he says, They will never enter my rest. 6

Therefore, since it remains for some to enter it, and those who formerly received the good

news did not enter because of disobedience, 7 he again specifies a certain day—today. He

specified this speaking through David after such a long time:

Today, if you hear his voice,

do not harden your hearts.

8 For if Joshua had given them rest, God would not have spoken later about another day. 9

Therefore, a Sabbath rest remains for God's people. 10 For the person who has entered his

rest has rested from his own works, just as God did from his. 11 Let us, then, make every

effort to enter that rest, so that no one will fall into the same pattern of disobedience.

12 For the word of God is living and effective and sharper than any double-edged sword,

penetrating as far as the separation of soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It is able to judge

the thoughts and intentions of the heart. 13 No creature is hidden from him, but all things

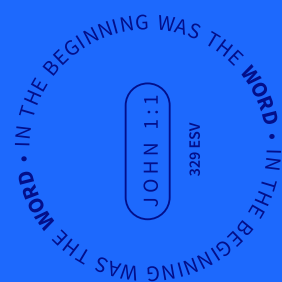
are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give an account.

THE WORD BECAME FLESH

1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 He was in the beginning with God. 3 All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. 4 In him was life, and the life was the light of men. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

6 There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. 7 He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all might believe through him. 8 He was not the light, but came to bear witness about the light.

9 The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world. 10 He was in the world, and the world was made through him, yet the world did not know him. 11 He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. 12 But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, 13 who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

14 And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. 15 John bore witness about him, and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks before me, because he was before me.' " 16 For from his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. 17 For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. 18 No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, he has made him known.

THE TESTIMONY OF JOHN THE BAPTIST

19 And this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" 20 He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, "I am not the Christ." 21 And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" And he answered, "No." 22 So they said to him, "Who are you? We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" 23 He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,' as the prophet Isaiah said."

24 (Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.) 25 They asked him, "Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" 26 John answered them, "I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, 27 even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." 28 These things took place in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

BEHOLD, THE LAMB OF GOD

29 The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! 30 This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks before me, because he was before me.' 31 I myself did not know him, but for this purpose I came baptizing with water, that he might be revealed to Israel." 32 And John bore witness: "I saw the Spirit descend from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. 33 I myself did not know him, but he who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' 34 And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God."

JESUS CALLS THE FIRST DISCIPLES

35 The next day again John was standing with two of his disciples, 36 and he looked at Jesus as he walked by and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" 37 The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. 38 Jesus turned and saw them following and said to them, "What are you seeking?" And they said to him, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?" 39 He said to them, "Come and you will see." So they came and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day, for it was about the tenth hour. 40 One of the two who heard John speak and followed Jesus was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. 41 He first found his own brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which means Christ). 42 He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon the son of John. You shall be called Cephas" (which means Peter).

JESUS CALLS PHILIP AND NATHANAEAL

43 The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, "Follow me." 44 Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. 45 Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the Law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." 46 Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." 47 Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no deceit!" 48 Nathanael said to him, "How do you know me?" Jesus answered him,

After 15 years in Bellingham, WA, where Faithlife is headquartered, Phil now resides in Noblesville, IN, with his wife, Shanna, and their five children.

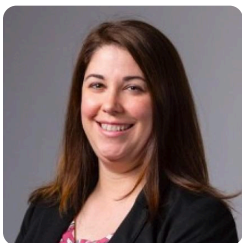


Chauncey Allmond
